Hello All,

You are receiving this newsletter because you have shown an interest or exchanged correspondence with the Orpington History Organisation in the past. If you do not wish to receive any further newsletters then please reply and we will take your contact information off the distribution list.

So why the newsletter? Well we have been running online for 6 years now and since the launch (in 2012) of our new website and introduction of our page on FaceBook, the interaction and interest in the local history of Orpington and it's district has far exceeded our expectations.

Our 'Organisation' is now a collective of many members from many Local History and Genealogy Groups. Some of our key members have allowed their personal collections of images and memories to be published on the site -in some cases some of these items have never been published before. As I have mentioned, the success in the last year has been exceptional and we have members from across the World (mainly people that lived in the area and emigrated). In 2012 we received and replied to 318 individual enquiries from our website for assistance with local history, genealogy and general Orpington queries. Since our 'revamped' site was launched in Jan '12 we have had over 5000 unique visitors from all over the world and over 30000 page visits! That along with over 450 Face Book 'likes' makes us very happy that we took this approach and all the hard work all very worthwhile!

We now have over 700 Enthusiasts and it was agreed that a quarterly newsletter made available to all would be good idea and keep generating interest.

Website and Facebook News

Website <u>Click Here</u>— we have been updating small areas of the website including updating disclaimer information on the use of web page 'cookies'. This EU law now makes it mandatory for websites to inform viewers on what data is being collected. Our cookies feed our Google Analytics account (which we use to tell how viewers we have) and that's it. We have also had to remind viewers that they should really ask us if they are going to use or copy or images. Some images have never been scanned before let along published on the 'www' so it is plain to see when they have been used and republished.

Facebook <u>Click Here</u> – We know this isn't everyone's cup of tea but it is a huge opportunity and one that we are glad we took up. There are now over 400 people following our updates and many of them interact with the updates. A recent post of information and photo of the Vanguard funeral procession was viewed by 4000+ people and drew in many more followers. People on Facebook will interact and comment on their own memories and post their own images etc. Some of the images posted on our page are very rare indeed.

- The Ramsden School for Boys We have recently received photos of the old school and with some other memories and items we are going to put an article together for this former local school.

We are also working on cataloguing, and publishing on the website, many photos and postcards that we have obtained recently.
